COVID-19 VIRUS UPDATE

I do not have the words to describe the last few months. The words crazy, unprecedented and unfathomable all come to mind, regarding this COVID-19 pandemic. Our response to calls, as first responders, has changed drastically. As of today, the total number of cases in Belmont County is 563. 4 of those remain hospitalized and 22 others have unfortunately succumbed to the virus. But some good news is that 504 have fully recovered. Numbers in the county have slowed, but vigilance is still needed among all first responders.

At 9-1-1, we continue to receive daily updates from the Health Department, regarding active positives. We enter those into the CAD, so that you can be updated when responding to a specific address. Regardless of any alert to you from Dispatch, we urge ALL first responders to use caution in all interactions with the public. Use your PPE! Let's all watch out for one another and get through this together.

LIFE SAVING EFFORT RECOGNIZED



On April 18, 2020 at 10:31, a 9-1-1 call was received by dispatcher Miranda Schramm. On the other end of the line was a mother reporting that her one-month old child was not breathing. The child was reported to be limp, blue and completely unresponsive. Miranda, without hesitation, began to give the mother CPR instructions. Her calm demeanor, quick actions and concise instructions helped to bring life back into the child, prior to the arrival of EMS to the scene. It was chilling to listen to, especially when hearing the child begin to make noises, and then fully cry, by the end of the call.

The discovery of this call led the 9-1-1 administration to create a new award to recognize efforts such as this, by our staff. Miranda was awarded the very first 9-1-1 Lifesaving Award. She was presented a framed certificate and will have her name affixed to a plaque, that will hang at the

Communications Center. While our 9-1-1 dispatchers handle thousands of calls every year, some of those calls really stand out and deserve additional recognition. This was one of those calls. Thank you, Miranda, for a job well done!

BELMONT COUNTY RADIO SYSTEM UPGRADES

We are in a holding pattern for the Paging and Microwave installation. They ran into delays with the licensing for the new Microwave with the FCC. They are awaiting the go ahead to move forward with install. The Microwave and Paging equipment is in and staged, ready to be put in service.

We hope that radio "flashing" (reprogramming) will begin soon. It will all depend on restrictions being lifted regarding COVID-19, so that radio programmers can gain access to all departments. Our best estimate is that we will begin the reprogramming in early fall. You will be contacted to schedule, well in advance of this beginning.

All of these upgrades will be paid with funds from the 9-1-1 Radio System Upgrade Levy. Without this levy, none of these upgrades and enhancements would be possible.
